# 'It's a lovely, sociable space'


The Lawrences made a traditional look work in a very modern layout - and so could you

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asmanian-born Jo Lawrence spent her twenties in Melbourne and then Perth. where she loved hanging out with friends at their homes in the countryside. 'The properties had enormous kitchens and I loved that everyone gathered around a big stove,' she explains. 'I'm quite sentimental, so those happy times have stayed with me.'

Jo got her chance to create her own country kitchen when she and her husband Mark bought their first house in Surrey in 2011. The galley kitchen had dated cupboards and pine cladding on the ceiling, but it was usable, so they saved up before starting a revamp. The couple decided to create a kitchen-diner by knocking through to the adjoining living room and building a double-storey side extension. 'We assumed we'd fit the kitchen in the area where the galley kitchen had been, but our architectural designer, Rob Beer from 3eleven, suggested switching it to the back of the new room. which would make space for a laundry area, too.'

Jo had very clear ideas about what style of kitchen she wanted: 'I've been compiling a scrapbook of pictures for several years, but this was the first time I was able to put it all into practice,' says Jo. 'Open-plan living is the way in Australia, so we wanted to make sure the space had plenty of light and bifold doors to the garden. It's a great feeling to finally have my own country kitchen within a lovely, sociable space.'

### WHAT THEY DID

Traditional farmhouse, with grey-painted Shaker-style doors, a range cooker. stone-effect flooring and marble-style worktops.

# How we did it

66 It was difficult to find a good kitchen company. The first one just didn't understand my dream of a mantel above a range cooker, saying it would be too crowded. It felt like a disaster as I was pregnant with my daughter Sophie and my due date was only a few months away. One of my colleagues recommended John Lewis of Hungerford in Fulham and Tanya Rossiter there was fantastic. She was really practical and thought of everything. from big drawers for the Aga pans, to a place to put our keys. Richard and Ziki, our builders from Taylor Property Services, started in June 2012 and finished at the end of September. I went into labour while they were still here! We spent about £70,000 on the whole house
